Thanks to 25 wonderful, caring Riverside neighbors, including a few moms with kids, who showed up on a very windy and chilly Saturday, our planting party was a total success. We were able to plant 30 heavy street trees, 40 shrubs and 90 Boston ivy plants in about five hours! Talk about team work - WOW! Everyone had a helpful, positive attitude and was willing to stick with it until all the plants were in the ground.

The Everett Public Works Department's Street Division was again of invaluable assistance. They generously agreed to mow the two-block long strip, and used their equipment to pre-dig holes for all the street trees. They closed off the streets for us and made sure we were safe. The Street Department also transported compost from our storage location to the site, brought hog fuel and topsoil, picked up all the big rocks and garbage we generated, and swept the street at the end of planting day. **THANK YOU Larry and crew!**

The Everett Parks and Recreation Department was also instrumental to our success. They brought their tool trailer, which included buckets, gloves and safety vests, plus many wheelbarrows, and picnic tables so we would have a place to sign people in, put breakfast snacks and lunches, and sit and eat. **THANK YOU Craig and Dan!**

Last, but certainly not least, the State Department of Corrections community service volunteers assisted us again by pre-digging the other planting holes that we had previously measured and marked. They also chopped down and dug out thicket of blackberries, and other weeds that were marked with orange paint. **THANK YOU Justin and crew!**

For those interested in the environment, you may have noticed the city has added three **hybrid buses** that began running this spring. They have also begun replacing the green, and some of the yellow traffic lights with LED bulbs, which will save the city about \$112,000 per year in energy costs!

Beginning in May, transit will begin a program called ORCA (One Card For All). Users can pay-as-they-go, and pay online. The card will work for all transit options in Snohomish and King counties.

The graffiti removal program has been so successful that it will now be expanded to commercial properties. See graffiti on a local business? Call the **graffiti hotline (257-URIT)** and they will contact the property owner about participating in the program and getting the city to remove the graffiti in a timely manner.

GARFIELD PARK WATCH GROUP

In the summer of 2007 Omar Rodriguez volunteered to head a group called Garfield Park Watch. He gathered names, phone numbers and email addresses of neighbors who were willing to step up and re-own our neighborhood park. The group went door-to-door passing out flyers and talking with neighbors. They even received a verbal commendation from the Everett Police Department on maintaining control when dealing with unruly kids. The group sports green ball caps with gold lettering, and when kids see them coming they feel safe to enjoy the park without being harassed by other kids. The goal of the group is to help prevent vandalism and harassment from over-taking our park. They are a group of neighbors and friends helping to keep Garfield Park a place for all to enjoy.

EVERETT BICYCLE PLAN

A master plan is underway to build on an existing network of more than 30 miles of bike lanes, including trails, on-street bikeways and end of trip facilities. The effort is being led by the City's Engineering & Public Services Department with assistance provided by Alta Planning + Design, a nationally-recognized firm from Portland, Oregon specializing in bicycle and pedestrian planning, design and implementation projects. There have been two community workshops to date, the final one this fall will set the stage for adopting a Bicycle Implementation Plan.
