## ROSS JOHNSON AND THE CDBG

Each year Riverside receives Community Development Block Grant, CDBG, funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which are used towards neighborhood revitalization. Our November speaker, Ross Johnson is the associate planner with the City of Everett's Planning and Community Development. He will be discussing the CDBG and projects where our funds can be put to good use.

## NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENTS

The City of Everett provides funding in the form of a Mini Grant where funds are matched by volunteer hours. Both the CDBG and Mini Grants are used towards neighborhood revitalization. In the past RNA members have voted to allocate grant money for everything from sidewalk repairs to park improvements. The Home of Excellence this month goes to Joline and David Lambert and their children Sarah and Connor who live at 2509 Rainier Avenue.



This beautiful jewel of a home, painted in the bright blue vintage color of its era, is accented with crisp white trim and was built back in 1920. The house may have been built earlier, as a previous owner noted it had been relocated from Everett Avenue many years ago.

The first thing you notice is the gorgeous, well-maintained yard with a variety of beautiful trees and plantings lovingly established and tended by Joline. She adores working in her garden paradise. Also note the massive stone walkway leading up to

their front porch, reconstructed to fit the house by David, very appropriate to the time and style of the home. He also placed a matching stone pathway leading from the front to the back of the home. Another feature surrounding the front base of their home is gorgeous tile-work inlaid with glass, stones and shells in the center, done with great care by Joline.

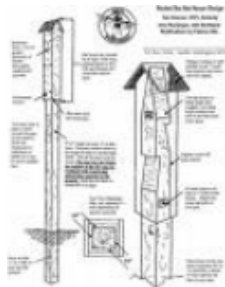
